

# 1.Vanmali Hall, Dadar West (1936)




Vanmali Hall, a three-storied structure nestled in Dadar West, Mumbai it is located on Chhabildas Road near Dadar Railway Station, it offers easy accessibility and serves as a popular venue for weddings, receptions, and social gatherings. Built by the Kshatriya Pathare Samaj, which was founded on 1 January 1885, the hall was designed by architect Kashiram Malik and inaugurated on 23 August 1936 by Dr. Gopal Vinayak Deshmukh. Originally envisioned as a space for societal reform advocating education for women and progressive marriage practices the hall has evolved into a dynamic cultural hub. Today, the Kshatriya Union Club organizes book exhibitions, competitions, and food festivals that celebrate authentic community cuisine. Architecturally, Vanmali Hall spans the first and second floors, with a unique spatial connection between a second-floor room and an adjoining balcony that together form a façade, acting as both a visual and functional boundary between interior and exterior. The ground floor, owned by the BMC, is frequently used for exhibitions and devotional gatherings like bhajans. With multiple air-conditioned halls and a terrace accommodating 150 to 275 guests, in-house catering, and amenities like changing rooms and sound systems, Vanmali Hall blends practicality with cultural richness making it not just a venue, but a living archive of community heritage and civic engagement.







SITE PLAN SCALE: 1:500

## 2.Ismail Gymkhana, Marine Lines (1964)





The Ismail Gymkhana is a heritage structure, originally established in 1891. It was constructed in 1964 by architect I.M. Kadri. The land on which it stands belongs to the Collector. Before its construction, the Gymkhana featured a simple hut-like tent primarily used by cricketers for resting. Over time, it evolved into a more organized and concrete structure, with multipurpose halls, a gym area and an admin office. The Gymkhana is known for its active sporting legacy. Regular cricket matches are held on the ground, even night tournaments also happen. The ground is also used as function venue. Upon entering, I observed a central lobby area that connects directly to the administration section. To the left of the entrance lies the manager's office. Adjacent to this is a large multipurpose hall used for hosting various events, which opens toward the ground area. Behind the manager's office, there is a pantry which has an entry from the ground side. The venue space behind the main office is frequently used for hosting events, and the revenue generated from these functions is utilized for ground maintenance. Beside the Islam gymkhana there is Parsi Gymkhana which also has a similar ground and the road between these two grounds sets their boundaries






LOCATION PLAN SCALE : 1: 1000











- 1 MULTI PURPOSE GIROUND 2 SITING/DINING SPACE





## 3. Zainabia Hall(1988)





Zainabia Hall was built on 3rd August 1988 by Arif Akhtar Hasan Rizvi, the owner of Rizvi Builders & Associates. It is located in Bhendi Bazar, a dense urban neighbourhood known for its rich cultural and religious history. The hall holds significance as a central Shia mourning venue, especially during the Muharram ceremonies, which span approximately two months. Surrounding the hall are various shops and residential apartments, many of which are directly connected to it through shared walls. The hall is accessed directly from the main street, creating a seamless flow between the public realm and the interior space. It is a two-storey structure: the ground floor functions as the main congregation space for religious events and ceremonies, while the first floor houses the administrative offices. The building follows a simple rectangular plan and is currently managed by the Saifee Burhani Upliftment Trust (SBUT) as part of the area's redevelopment initiative. The hall lacks a dedicated ventilation system, relying on ceiling fans and limited window openings for air circulation.
















# 4. Maheshwari Bhavan, Oshiwara (2005)




Maheshwari Bhavan, located in Oshiwara Andheri West was built by Maheshwari Pragati Mandal in 2005. It is the common space used to host formal and informal gatherings for the 4000 Maheshwari families in Mumbai. It is a 5 storeyed building consisting of 4 banquet halls and a common eating hall on the ground floor. The first and the fourth floors have the bigger halls used for family and informal gatherings whereas the second and the third floors each have 2 green rooms outside the hall and a smaller hall used for formal and office gatherings. The floors are accessible by both a dogleg staircase and an elevator. The height of all the halls is 4 metres





I SCALE-1:1000, LOCATION PLAIN




SCALE 1:500 , SITE PLAN








SCALET: 200 , PROGRAM ANALYSIS
